Introduction

Black Campus Ministries is purposed in reaching Black students from across the African Diaspora through BCM small groups and chapters throughout the nation. To better serve our Black corners on campus, a list of tasks and resources have been compiled based on the state of your group. Our hope is that each campus will offer Black students an opportunity to be a part of a group that best fits the context of their campus.


As you continue in the document, you will notice there are three stages in the BCM group's development. The graphic illustrates the correlation between student and staff involvement in each stage. Though there are no explicit distinctions, the recommendations in this document serve both a BCM small group and chapter context. It is our recommendation, however, that if your existing or planted group is a small group that grows to have 10 or more committed students with high ownership, you would prayerfully consider transitioning your BCM group to a chapter.

The resources included in the banks on each page break down into four categories - Bible Studies, Trainings, Discipleships, and Outreaches. These resources are a compilation of items from current and previous staff, offerings from the InterVarsity staff store, and books from InterVarsity Press. The recommendations for each stage's resource bank are given based on the experiences of senior Black staff across the movement, and what we have learned over the years about what best serves Black students across the different chapter stages. Thus the resources are purposely separated into each stage; however, feel freedom to use the resources throughout given your chapter's context. Some general resources that may be helpful no matter the stage include: <u>BCM NSO Tips</u>, <u>BCM Small Group Tips</u>, and <u>General Outreach Ideas</u> (Ongoing).

Planting/ Replanting a BCM Group

Staff will have to be VERY directive for this chapter state. Staff should spend their time establishing a foundation for the group, building personal relationships with students, and discipling any students connected to the movement. If you have potential student connections, as much as possible try to get their input about the plant and encourage them to get to know one another.

Estimated Number of Students Being Reached: 0 - 4 Students

Growing a BCM Group

While staff will have to be SOMEWHAT directive for this chapter state, staff should focus on releasing more and more of the ministry to core students to increase their ownership. Core students are students who have committed to helping to lead and grow the BCM ministry for the campus alongside the staff. Establish a core team from these committed students, that is separate from the rest of the fellowship, so they can receive additional discipleship and training. This process should not be rushed as not to overwhelm core students, especially if your core is less than four students. This growth process can stretch a few semesters or years.

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Estimated Number of Students Being Reached: 5 - 19 Students

Tasks:

- Build Personal Relationships with Core Student(s): meet regularly for one-on-one personal conversations with each core student
- Disciple and Train Core Students: Lead discipleship and missional training for students to grow spiritually and be equipped to reach their campus
- Release More Ownership to Core Students: Begin transferring ministry responsibilities to core students to shape ministry together
- Model Campus Ministry for Students:
 - Regularly Pray for the Campus with Students
 - Formulate and Share the Vision for BCM Ministry
 - Lead Weekly/Bi-Weekly Bible Studies
 - Plan and Execute Campus Outreaches with Students
 - Make at Least One Call to Faith Each Semester
 - Gather Students together through Socials
 - Follow-Up with Interested New Students

Building a BCM Group

In this chapter state, staff should be an adviser for the ministry and LESS directive. Staff should primarily spend their time advising the student leadership team and maintaining personal relationships with each leader. The student leaders should be elected or appointed from among the group's committed core students and be ready to hold the ownership of the group. When a BCM chapter reaches this state, the group should be seen as a student-let ministry able to function without a staff-presence.

Estimated Number of Students Being Reached: 20 or More Students

Page 7 Tasks:

- Maintain Personal Relationships with Student Leaders: meet regularly for one-on-one personal conversations with each student leader
- Focus on Advising Student Leaders: let your student leaders take full responsibility of chapter duties and advise them as needed
- Train Student Leaders to Disciple Others: conduct missional trainings for student leaders to be able to disciple and train other students
- Resource Student Leaders: make sure student leaders are aware of any resources available from the area/region/national offices
- Hold Student Leaders Accountable to their Chapter Leadership:
 - Keeping an overarching chapter vision
 - Upholding a chapter-wide prayer routine
 - Developing and strengthening relationships with others
 - Discipling others for personal spiritual growth
 - Hosting high-quality transformative campus outreaches
 - Training others to serve missionally on campus
 - Maintaining an evangelistic foundation with regular calls to faith
 - Providing weekly/bi-weekly student-led Bible Studies
 - Strengthening community by holding regular socials
